Class of 1969 Thornton Fractional Township South High School, Lansing, IL


Since we arrived in Anchorage back in 1981, we have been through quite a few earthquakes of assorted magnitudes and distances from us. Most of those I considered a geologic curiosity/fact of life and educational. About a half dozen will remain emblazoned in my memory forever. Earlier in 2018 we felt a large quake. I said at that time that was as large a quake as I ever cared to feel.

As of 30 November, 2018, those words are cheap, as we made it through the magnitude 7 event centered about 20 miles north of us. We're OK...rather shaken, however. Someone described it as having a runaway freight train run through your house.



Everything happened at once—the roar, the initial pulse, and the shaking. I'd been working on a column for the Geological Society. I bolted from the PC and headed to the living room. I grabbed the globe made of semi precious stones and placed it on the floor. I got no further when the lights went out. Everything was shaking, things were falling and crashing and the house groaned from every corner. This was by far the most vigorous and violent event we'd ever encountered. I hung on to the mantle for dear life for the longest time. I feared we'd have broken windows, broken walls and foundation. The shaking lasted about 30 seconds and that seemed to be forever. A few minutes later another quake shook us in the dark. It was smaller at magnitude 5.7, but not by much.

Fortunately, we knew where our lights and lanterns were and soon found that our casualties were bookcases unloaded, smashed/crashed knick knacks, broken picture glass/frames, and a few ceramic things. The cupboards kept things intact.



The worst though was heading downstairs in the dark and hearing running water. It seems a T-fitting on the water line to the boiler for the in-floor heating had cracked, and water was spraying across a room. I first turned off all the water to the house. Then when the water kept spraying, I started turning the valves to the boiler. I also killed the gas and turned the boiler off. It still didn't staunch the water. So I rigged a screen to keep it from spraying everywhere. Then I mopped and broomed water into the floor drain for a long time.

After I took a break and checked on the neighbors and their gas lines, I got back to the boiler. By this time, we were getting some daylight and I finally found the valve which isolated the boiler. It killed the spray. I figure it was draining the whole house. I felt like Mickey Mouse in the Sorcerer's Apprentice, but it was probably closer to 10 or 15 gallons.

Without power for a few hours, we heard every aftershock rumbling like approaching

thunder before the shakings. There were several each hour following the main quake. These things really shake you up even if you know they probably aren't going to be major. We heard them even after the power returned, and of course, all through the night. Sleep didn't come easily for a couple of days.

I've gotten the books re-shelved and discovered that a ceramic apple about a foot in diameter held 37.4 lbs of pennies and small change. Damage varied from room to room, but we've found no structural damage, although about 100 buildings in Anchorage were listed as uninhabitable and another 200 required a lot of work. Earthquake insurance is expensive with about \$50,000 deductible. It's still debatable whether it's worth it.

It's true that when your world reminds you of your true minuscule status in the Universe you get religion...and with every aftershock too. So far, I'm through Pastafarianism and on my way to Zoroastrianism.

A Valentine for Linda




