

Making Wine in Michigan A Hobby with Benefits by Pam Neal Pfeffer



My husband Mel (TFN'66) and I live on the shores of Lake Michigan in Bridgman, Michigan. There are about 10 Michigan wineries within a 10-mile radius of our home. So it is not too surprising that when we have time, Mel indulges in his hobby of winemaking.

Now in March, our vineyard is under a blanket of snow.



But after the summer growing season, we will harvest the red wine grapes and white wine grapes in September and October.

 ${\sf T}$ he process for making red or white wine is each a little different. Red wine grapes are

destemmed and crushed in a few evenings and then prepared as a mash for fermentation. To do this, we put them into barrels, cover the barrels, and use heat lamps 24/7 to cook the mash.

We add yeast to help with the sugar and use a hydrometer to test for alcohol levels. When you get it to the level that you want, you press the mash and transfer it to wood wine barrels to ferment.

Mel does several types of testing during the fermentation months and adds any needed additives. We have made CabFranc, Merlot, Mead, Port, and Loganberry using this process. <u>Click here for Kisses Sweeter than Wine</u>



The process for white wines is a little different. You destem them, crush them, and press them in one night, and clarify by using different compounds. Then we put them into stainless steel kegs. Used beer kegs work well for this.

Again, Mel tests with the hydrometer and adds the additives needed. We have made Riesling, Chardonnay, Peach, and the ice wine Riesling. Grapes for ice wine are not picked until after the first freeze because they are the sweetest at this time. That makes ice wine more expensive because there is a smaller quantity of it.

Our friends and family help with the bottling. We bottle white wine around Memorial Day and red wine in July or August. I provide the food for this all-day process—two long tables of snacks, food, and sandwiches. Of course there is wine tasting too. We once bottled more than 1,000 bottles of both white and red on the same day. Did I mention this is a hobby?

My husband learned how to make wine from a close friend whose dad made wine. Our first batch was so dry that adding Sprite or sugar didn't help. But as it sat in bottles, it became more smooth. We have a note on a few bottles—DO NOT TOUCH UNLESS THE

Bridgman is located on the Michigan Shore Wine Trail stretching along I-94. Some of the wineries in the area are Baroda Founders, Dablon, Domaine Berrien (Pam and Mel's favorite!), Free Run, Hickory Creek, Lazy Ballerina, Lemon Creek, Tabor Hill, and Round Barn, which also makes beer, vodka, and whiskey.
