Fine Wine & the Lake Michigan Shore—

An Exquisite Summer Festival

If you think Michigan is not the place for fabulous wine, you'd be thinking wrong. If you like wine and are looking for summer fun, come and experience Michigan wine country.

My husband Mel (TFN '66) and I live near the shores of Lake Michigan in Bridgman, Michigan. We moved here in June 1993 with our two daughters. We found a wonderful home on five acres, three of which are covered with grape vines. We learned a great many things about the vines

from some remarkable people who were gracious enough to share their knowledge.

During our early years here, wineries began to pop up in the area. They soon came together to start the <u>Lake Michigan Shore Wine Trail</u> consisting of a dozen wineries and tasting rooms within a short drive of each other.



Initially, during a two-day event, visitors could visit all the wineries up and down the shores of Lake Michigan tasting and trying food made with local wine. This was very successful and made for a fun weekend, but it soon became apparent that there were too many wineries to visit in just two days.

As a result, the wineries created the Lake Michigan Shore Wine Festival. For one day each year, all the wineries come together in one location so the public can sample more wine without the hassle of driving to all the different wineries.

The festival is held at Weko Beach, which is right next to Warren Dunes for those of you who remember going there the day after our TFS prom. The continued success of the festival over the years brought more and more wineries in to join the fun. There are now more than 20 wineries participating in the festival.

Mel and I have been volunteering for the festival for many years now. We're first on duty when the gates open to the public. In the beginning, we helped <u>Domaine Berrien Cellers</u> pour the different wines they brought to the festival. However, for the past few years we have moved over to selling tickets for the actual tasting.



If you attend this year's festival

Saturday, June 17,
2017, let me tell you what to expect when you arrive.

As you drive into
Weko Beach, you
come up over a small
hill, and the first
thing you see are the
beautiful shores of
Lake Michigan.

As you look to your right, there are the trucks that house all

of the wine, ice, and supplies, and next to them is the giant tent for all the wineries that are already set up and ready to go.

Parking is free, but there is not enough parking at the beach for everyone. However, there is additional parking at many of the nearby businesses, and free shuttle buses are available for those having to park farther away.

The festival does charge an admittance fee, but with the fee you get a wine glass that you will use to taste as many of the available wines that you wish to try. After paying the admittance fee, you may see Mel and me along with other volunteers at a nearby table selling tickets for the tasting. Each ticket costs a dollar and the average taste is around three tickets. A full glass of wine could cost between seven and eight tickets, depending on the winery.


Bottled water is also available for a dollar and food is cash only. There are several food vendors to choose from, and entertainment is provided throughout the day and night by several bands. Closing time is 10 pm since the festival is held near a residential area.

It is an exquisite setting for a fun day as you walk the beach with a glass of merlot in hand, salute the lake boats with a chalice of chardonnay, or sway to the music as you sip a local pinot noir. Mel and I hope to see you there!

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
