## Having a Twin Sister, Losing a Twin Sister by John Link (Illinois)

#### In Memory of Our Classmate Patricia Link Cox 1951–2018

**Patricia Link Cox** was my older sister by a few minutes. (I always reminded her of that.) We were six weeks premature at birth; she was healthy and I struggled in the hospital for three weeks before they finally sent me home.

Pat was a beautiful girl with a great sense of humor that we shared as twins.

In our early youth, we were very close playmates. I recall long trips in the car where we would take turns lying in the back seat or up on what my Dad called the "poop deck," the area in front of the rear window. As we got taller, the rear floor was the second bed and not very comfortable.



As we got older and found neighborhood friends, I, of course, would play outside with boys in the neighborhood. Thinking back, all the neighborhood kids on Chicago Avenue were boys. Who did my sister play with? Shame on me for not knowing the answer to this.



We lived at 173rd and Chicago Avenue. We were the first ones on the school bus to St. John's Lutheran School in the morning and the last ones dropped off in the afternoon. We sang songs on the bus to pass the time. I recall many of them being TV commercial songs and of course Mickey Mouse Club songs. We would get off the bus and run to the house to sit in front of the small black and white TV screen to watch the Mickey Mouse Club. *"Meeska, Mooska, Mousekateer, mouse cartoon time now is here."* What kids in the '50s and '60s didn't watch that program?

My classmates at St. John's will attest to my growth issue. Pat was always much taller than I. As a matter of fact, all 20 kids in my 8th-grade graduating class were taller than me except for, I believe, Sherry Nondorf Bingham, whom I passed up starting in 8th grade. Finally, in the summer of '67, I flew past Pat on my way to bragging rights. I no longer had to stand on my tippy toes when pictures were taken of the two of us.

At the age of 16, she developed juvenile diabetes, and a few episodes of her going into a diabetic coma during the night were the scariest events I've ever experienced. But Pat was a brave and determined girl, and the only thing that was going to slow her down were our parents, who became very protective of her as good parents would.


She dated the likes of Rich Krilich, Fred Hasse, Joe O'Malley. Dad didn't like any of her boyfriends (just kidding guys). She got married in 1971 to a guy from Dyer named Brooks and moved to Warsaw, Indiana, where they had two sons, Brian and Brad. Her first marriage didn't work out, but she found the best guy a woman could ask for, Mike Cox. Mike was a police officer, and Pat made a little extra money cleaning homes for clients that she had for many years.



Her struggles with diabetes continued. She had kidney and pancreas transplants, both of which were highly successful. Pat and Mike retired a couple of years ago and were looking forward to enjoying time on the lake in Indiana with the pontoon boat they purchased last year.

On March 14th of this year, Pat had emergency heart surgery to replace her mitral valve and to bypass two arteries. Due to complications with her lungs and inability to breath on her own, other internal organs failed three weeks after surgery. Sadly, on April 9th, she got her Angel Wings.

Pat was my only sibling. After having twins in 1951, I can't blame my mom for not wanting more kids. I love and will miss Pat dearly, but I have one thing I can continue to brag about—I knew her nine months longer than anybody else.
